Loss of a True Friend Susan Crocker



Sadly, Friends board member Susan Crocker passed away suddenly October 12. Although she was on our board only a short time, her impact on the work of the Friends was profound. She spearheaded an effort to design an expansion of our Huddart Park Nature Hikes program to include third and fourth grade classes, recruited many new naturalist docents, and revised the entire training curriculum to implement the Next Generation Science Standards. Susan was an active member of the Woodside community as a whole, serving on the Town Council and as Mayor in 1993 as well as a volunteering at Filoli and the Academy of Sciences.

One effort that Susan felt passionately about was providing school bus funding for low-income children to experience Huddart Park Nature Hikes. We currently have four classes that want to hike in the spring, but they need funds for buses to get to the park. County Offering Free Shuttle Service to Wunderlich



It's now easier to enjoy hiking, picnicking, and nature exploration at Wunderlich and to attend scheduled nature walks, history programs and other events led by park rangers and Friends docents. In an effort to bring more residents from areas with little access to the parks, San Mateo County Parks' Park Shuttle now links East Palo Alto,

the Fair Oaks neighborhood in Redwood City, and Menlo Park residents to Wunderlich. The free shuttle service begins at 9 A.M. every Saturday and Sunday at Marketplace Park in Menlo Park. Merck Scientists Give Work Day to Wunderlich

On a beautiful June day, eighteen employees from Merck Research Labs in Palo Alto returned to what is now their annual Give A Work Day to support the Friends and the San Mateo County Parks. As part of a team-building experience and a company effort to donate service to the community, they spent a day replacing a 15-year old wooden fence. The manual labor entailed digging out the old posts and full fence running along the Carriage House, replacing it with new, deeper post holes and a two-tiered cross-rung fence. The fence protects visitors and equestrians as well as aesthetically maintains the area. It is worth a visit to Wunderlich to see the handiwork of what a few inexperienced and mostly first-time fence builders can do in a single day. Discovering the Great Outdoors

ffering programming for the first time beyond the school year in Huddart Park, The Friends partnered with two other non-profits this past summer, Girls to Women and LifeMoves, to provide outdoor and science experiences for 120 children from neighboring communities.

Girls to Women provides underserved girls in East Palo Alto with after-school and summer programs to boost self-confidence and encourage learning. Menlo Park-based LifeMoves helps homeless families become self-sufficient.

As with many low-income participants in the Huddart Park Nature Hikes Program visiting for the first time, for many it was their first encounter with the woods. The kids were awed by the height of the redwoods, the insect-repellent traits of the bay leaf, the beauty of a soaring red-tailed hawk. Humming with energy, the kids peppered the Friends hike leaders with questions as they discovered what was, for them, an unknown world.

One 11-year-old who attends a charter school in East Palo Alto, said she felt the hike helped her learn more about nature. She giggled as she described what she now knows about the scat of forest-dwelling mammals, always a popular topic among student visitors. Another participant said she was fascinated by the sheer height of the redwood trees and was in disbelief that the tallest living redwood of record in California really was 379 feet—taller than the length of a football field.

Perhaps one of the most powerful moments was when hike leader Dick Young led his group into a fairy ring of young redwoods to be encircled by nature in that unique way that only redwoods offer. Together, the group recited, "Respect your neighbor, respect yourself, and respect nature." If the Huddart Park Nature Hikes Program has a hand in encouraging the upcoming generation to act this way, it will have accomplished a prime part of the Friends' mission—fostering future stewardship of the parks.
